CHAPTER I.

Historical Sketch of the Academy

The Imperial Academy was organized in accordance with the *Statute of the Imperial Academy*, promulgated in Imperial Ordinance No. 149, on June 12th, 1906. An organization of similar nature had been in existence since 1879.

The history of the Tôkyô Academy, the immediate predecessor of the Imperial Academy, may be briefly stated as follows.

In 1878, Dr. David Murray, the American adviser to the Department of Education, suggested to the Government the advisability of establishing an academy for the purpose of encouraging the study of science and art, and promoting their wider diffusion. The idea was approved by the Minister of Education, Yorimichi Saigô; and in December of the same year, seven eminent scholars, namely, Amané Nishi, Hiroyuki Katô, Kôhei Kanda, Mamichi Tsuda, Seichoku Nakamura, Yukichi Fukuzawa, and Shûhei Mitsukuri were requested by the Minister to draft the *Statute of the Tôkyô Academy*.
