



Professor Harry Miller died unexpectedly on December 12, 2018 at the age of 79. He was a well-known Bosnian-American mathematician who published numerous, significant scientific works, many of which were joint papers with scholars from several different countries. In addition, he was known for his unselfish dedication to advancing the scientific progress in his adopted country of Bosnia and Herzegovina, which earned him a membership in Academy of Sciences of Bosnia and Herzegovina. He and his wife, Naza Tanović-Miller, founded *Radovi Matematički* in 1985.

Professor Miller was born in 1939 and grew up in the Hyde Park area of Chicago, Illinois. He received his Master of Science degree in 1960 and his Ph.D. in 1966 both from the Illinois Institute of Technology, where he met Bosnian-born Naza Tanović in 1964. After graduation, he took a position at De Paul University of Chicago, which he left in 1969 to accompany Naza to her beloved but impoverished Sarajevo, Bosnia. As he would jokingly recall, “In 1969 I left \$1,000 a month job, for a \$100 a month job, the same year when America landed on the Moon.”

He taught at University of Sarajevo until April 1992, the start of the three year long war that devastated the country. As an American citizen, he and Naza could have left the besieged city right away, but they stayed until the middle of 1993 in order to help spread the word of the human tragedies that
