THE JUNE MEETING IN PORTLAND

The six hundred fifty-seventh meeting of the American Mathematical Society was held on Saturday, June 15, 1968 at Reed College, in Portland, Oregon, in conjunction with meetings of the Pacific Northwest Section of the Mathematical Association of America and the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics. There were approximately 154 registrants at this meeting, 120 of whom were members of the Society.

By invitation of the Committee to Select Hour Speakers for Far Western Sectional Meetings, there were two hour addresses presented at the meeting. Professor William G. Bade of the University of California, Berkeley spoke on Sources of equicontinuity in functional analysis. He was introduced by Professor Bertram Yood. Professor W. A. J. Luxemburg of the California Institute of Technology presented the second hour address, entitled On some recent developments in the theory of Riesz spaces. Professor Luxemburg was introduced by Professor Ralph James.

There were six sessions for contributed papers, presided over by Professors Richard Barrar, David Eaves, John Leadley, Eugene Maier, Andrew Moursund, and Dorothy Williams.
