

LEOPOLDT KERNELS AND CENTRAL EXTENSIONS OF ALGEBRAIC NUMBER FIELDS

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§ 1. Introduction

Let k be an algebraic number field of finite degree, and p be a fixed rational prime. We denote the set of all the non-Archimedean prime divisors of k by $S_0(k)$ and the set of all the real Archimedean ones by $S_\infty^+(k)$. Put $S_0 = \{\mathfrak{p} \in S_0(k) \mid \mathfrak{p} \nmid p\}$, $S_\infty = S_\infty^+(k)$ and $S = S_0 \cup S_\infty$, and define a subgroup of the unit group $\mathcal{O}^\times(k)$ of k by

$$E(k; S) = \{\varepsilon \in \mathcal{O}^\times(k) \mid \varepsilon \equiv 1 \pmod{\mathfrak{p}} \text{ for } \mathfrak{p} \in S\}.$$

Then the \mathbf{Z}_p -module $\bar{E}^{(p)}(k) := E(k; S) \otimes_{\mathbf{Z}} \mathbf{Z}_p$ is isomorphic to $\mu_p(k) \times \mathbf{Z}_p^r$, or to \mathbf{Z}_p^r if $p = 2$ and $r_1 > 0$ where $\mu_p(k)$ is the multiplicative group of the p -power roots of 1 in k and $r = r_1 + r_2 - 1$, $r_1 = |S_\infty^+(k)|$, $2r_2 = [k: \mathbf{Q}] - r_1$, is the essential \mathbf{Z} -rank of $\mathcal{O}^\times(k)$. Furthermore we can define a homomorphism $\pi_S: \bar{E}^{(p)}(k) \rightarrow \prod_{\mathfrak{p} \in S_0} k_{\mathfrak{p}}^\times$ by the diagonal embedding of k^\times into the last direct product. The kernel of π_S is the Leopoldt kernel for k , p and S , and denoted by $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$ or by $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$.

The Leopoldt conjecture is to claim $\mathcal{L}_p(k) = 1$, and known to be true for every p in case where k is a subfield of not only abelian extensions but also certain types of extensions containing non-abelian 2-extensions of imaginary quadratic fields, and also of some special extensions of \mathbf{Q} (e.g. Brumer [B], Miyake [M1] etc.)

It is known by Nguyen-Quang-Do [Ng], Heider [H2] and others that $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$ is isomorphic to the Pontrjagin dual of the Schur multiplier of the group of a certain Galois extension. More precisely speaking, let $k^{(p)}(S)$ be the maximal p -extension of k unramified outside S . Then we have

$$H^2(\text{Gal}(k^{(p)}(S)/k), \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z}) \cong \text{Hom}(\mathcal{L}_p(k), \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z}).$$

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One of our purposes of this paper is to clear the meaning of this isomorphism. Let $k^{(p)}$ be the maximal p -extension of k , and M be the maximal central p -extension of $k^{(p)}(S)/k$. Then the maximal abelian p -extension $k^{\text{ab}(p)}$ of k is a subfield of M . Put $\mathfrak{G}^{(p)} = \text{Gal}(k^{(p)}/k)$, $\mathfrak{g}^{(p)} = \text{Gal}(k^{(p)}(S)/k)$ and $\mathfrak{n}^{(p)} = \text{Gal}(k^{(p)}/k^{(p)}(S))$. Then we have

$$H^2(\mathfrak{G}^{(p)}, \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z}) = 0$$

by Tate [Se], and easily see

$$H^2(\mathfrak{g}^{(p)}, \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z}) \cong \text{Hom}(\text{Gal}(M/k^{(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}), \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z})$$

by the Hochschild-Serre exact sequence for the short exact sequence

$$1 \longrightarrow \mathfrak{n}^{(p)} \longrightarrow \mathfrak{G}^{(p)} \longrightarrow \mathfrak{g}^{(p)} \longrightarrow 1.$$

As the duals to the same $H^2(\mathfrak{g}^{(p)}, \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z})$, therefore, $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$ is isomorphic to $\text{Gal}(M/k^{(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)})$. We will establish a natural isomorphism between them directly by class field theory.

Here we have explained the special case of S where $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S) = \mathcal{L}_p(k)$ corresponds to the Leopoldt conjecture. We will treat a general set of prime divisors of k as S in what follows.

§ 2. Leopoldt kernels

Let k and p be as above. We denote the idele group of k by k_A^\times . We consider k^\times a diagonally embedded subgroup of k_A^\times .

Let S be a set of prime divisors of k , and $S = S_0 \cup S_\infty$, $S_0 = S \cap S_0(k)$, $S_\infty = S - S_0$. Put

$$E(k; S_\infty) = \{\varepsilon \in \mathcal{O}^\times(k) \mid \varepsilon \equiv 1 \pmod{\mathfrak{p}} \text{ for } \mathfrak{p} \in S_\infty\};$$

this depends only upon $S_\infty^+ := S_\infty \cap S_\infty^+(k)$. Denote the topological closure of the projection of $E(k; S_\infty)$ to the non-Archimedean part of k_A^\times by $\overline{E}_0(k; S_\infty)$; this is an abelian profinite group; let $\overline{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)$ be its p -primary part. The ring of p -adic integers \mathbf{Z}_p naturally acts on this group. It is well known that $\overline{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)$ is isomorphic to $\mu_p(k) \times \mathbf{Z}_p^r$ or to \mathbf{Z}_p^r (in non-trivial cases for $p = 2$) as \mathbf{Z}_p -modules (cf. Chevalley [Ch] or Heider [H1], Satz 4, for example).

Let π_{S_0} be the projection homomorphism of k_A^\times onto its S_0 -part, $\prod'_{\mathfrak{p} \in S_0} k_\mathfrak{p}^\times$, where $k_\mathfrak{p}$ is the completion of k by \mathfrak{p} and \prod' denotes the restricted product with respect to the maximal compact subgroup $\mathcal{O}^\times(k_\mathfrak{p})$ of $k_\mathfrak{p}^\times$ for $\mathfrak{p} \in S_0$.

The groups

$$\mathcal{L}(k; S) := \text{Ker } \pi_{S_0} \cap \bar{E}_0(k; S_\infty),$$

and

$$\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S) := \text{Ker } \pi_{S_0} \cap \bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)$$

are the Leopoldt kernels in k for S and p . It is not difficult to see that this $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ for $S = S_0 \cup S_\infty$ with $S_0 = \{\mathfrak{p} \in S_0(k) \mid \mathfrak{p} \nmid p\}$ and $S_\infty = S_\infty^+(k)$ is canonically isomorphic to $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$ which was given in the preceding section; hence we also denote $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ in this case by $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$ for simplicity.

The homomorphism π_{S_0} maps the torsion part ($\cong \mu_p(k)$ if exists) of $\bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)$ injectively if $S_0 \neq \emptyset$; then $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ is a torsion free \mathbb{Z}_p -module.

The abelian pro- p -group $\bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)$ is mapped into the abelian profinite group $\prod_{\mathfrak{p} \in S_0} \mathcal{O}^\times(k_{\mathfrak{p}})$ by π_{S_0} . If \mathfrak{p} does not divide p , the p -primary part of $\mathcal{O}^\times(k_{\mathfrak{p}})$ is equal to the finite cyclic group $\mu_p(k_{\mathfrak{p}})$ of p -power roots of 1 in $k_{\mathfrak{p}}$. Therefore the p -primary part of the direct product $\prod \mathcal{O}^\times(k_{\mathfrak{p}})$ is a finite group if $\mathfrak{p} \nmid p$ for every $\mathfrak{p} \in S_0$ and if $|S_0| < +\infty$; then the \mathbb{Z}_p -rank of $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ coincides the essential \mathbb{Z}_p -rank of $\bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)$ and is equal to $r = r_1 + r_2 - 1$. Summing up, we have

PROPOSITION 1. (1) *If $S_0 \neq \emptyset$, then $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ is a torsion free \mathbb{Z}_p -module.*

(2) *If $0 < |S_0| < +\infty$, and if $\mathfrak{p} \nmid p$ for every $\mathfrak{p} \in S_0$, then the \mathbb{Z}_p -rank of $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ is equal to the essential \mathbb{Z} -rank of $\mathcal{O}^\times(k)$; hence in particular, the quotient group $\bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty)/\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ is a finite p -group in this case.*

Remark. If $p \neq 2$, then $\bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; S_\infty) = \bar{E}_0^{(p)}(k; \emptyset)$ because the quotient group $E(k; \emptyset)/E(k; S_\infty)$ is an elementary 2-group.

§ 3. The central extensions

For a given set S of prime divisors of k , we denote the maximal p -extension (abelian p -extension or abelian extension, resp.) of k which is unramified outside S by $k^{(p)}(S)$ ($k^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)$ or $k^{\text{ab}}(S)$, resp.).

Let S_∞ be the Archimedean part of S as above, and put $\bar{S}_\infty := S_0(k) \cup S_\infty$. Then by definition, $\text{Gal}(k^{\text{ab}}/k^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty))$ is a (finite) elementary 2-group. If $p \neq 2$, therefore, we have $k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty) = k^{\text{ab}(p)}$.

Suppose that a finite Galois extension K/k is unramified outside S . Let S^K be the set of all the prime divisors of elements of S in K . If K/k is a p -extension, then the maximal p -extension of K unramified outside

S^K is none other than $k^{(p)}(S)$. We simply write $K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)$ for $K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S^K)$, etc., because there is no fears of ambiguity.

In general, we denote the maximal central extension (or p -extension, resp.) of a Galois extension F/k by $(F/k)^{\text{cen}}$ (or $(F/k)^{\text{cen}(p)}$, resp.).

THEOREM 1. *Let the notation and the assumptions be as above. Then the Galois groups of the extensions*

$$(K^{\text{ab}}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K^{\text{ab}}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)$$

and

$$(K^{\text{ab}}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$$

are naturally isomorphic to the quotient groups

$$\mathcal{L}(k; S)/N_{K/k}\mathcal{L}(K; S^K)$$

and

$$\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)/N_{K/k}\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(K; S^K),$$

respectively, where $N_{K/k}: K_A^\times \rightarrow k_A^\times$ is the norm map of K/k .

Proof. Put $\mathfrak{g} = \text{Gal}(K/k)$, $\mathfrak{G} = \text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/k)$, $\mathfrak{A} = \text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K)$ and $\mathfrak{B} = \text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K^{\text{ab}}(S))$. Then \mathfrak{A} and \mathfrak{B} are abelian closed normal subgroups of \mathfrak{G} , and $\mathfrak{g} = \mathfrak{G}/\mathfrak{A}$. The inner automorphisms of \mathfrak{G} naturally determines an action of \mathfrak{g} on \mathfrak{A} and \mathfrak{B} . The subgroup $[\mathfrak{B}, \mathfrak{G}]$ of commutators of \mathfrak{B} and \mathfrak{G} coincides with

$$\mathfrak{B}^{\mathfrak{g}} := \langle a^{1-\sigma} \mid a \in \mathfrak{B}, \sigma \in \mathfrak{g} \rangle$$

where the right hand side means the topologically generated closed subgroup of \mathfrak{B} . Therefore we have

$$\text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/(K^{\text{ab}}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty) = \mathfrak{B}^{\mathfrak{g}}.$$

Now let $\alpha_K: K_A^\times \rightarrow \text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}/K)$ be the Artin map of class field theory; this is a surjective homomorphism the kernel $K^\#$ of which is the closure of $K^\times \cdot K_{\infty+}^\times$ in the idele group K_A^\times where $K_{\infty+}^\times$ is the connected component of 1 in K_A^\times . Put $S'_\infty = S_\infty^+(k) - S_\infty$ and

$$K^\#(S'_\infty) := K^\# \cdot \prod_{\mathfrak{p} \in S'_\infty} K_{\mathfrak{p}}^\times.$$

Then $\text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}/K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty))$ is isomorphic to the elementary 2-group $K^\#(S'_\infty)/K^\#$ by α_K .

Through the inner automorphisms of $\text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/k)$, the abelian group $\text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K)$ becomes a \mathfrak{g} -module; α_K induces a \mathfrak{g} -isomorphism of $K_A^\times/K^\#(S'_\infty)$ onto $\text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K)$ which maps the p -primary part $(K_A^\times/K^\#(S'_\infty))^{(p)}$ onto $\mathfrak{U}^{(p)} = \text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K)$. Denote the subgroup of K_A^\times ,

$$\{(\cdots, x_{\mathfrak{p}}, \cdots) \in \mathcal{O}^\times(K_A) \mid x_{\mathfrak{p}} = 1 \text{ for } \mathfrak{p} \in S_0^K \text{ and for every Archimedean } \mathfrak{p}\}$$

by $U'(K; S_0)$. Then by α_K , \mathfrak{B} corresponds to

$$U'(K; S_0) \cdot K^\#(S'_\infty)/K^\#(S'_\infty).$$

It is also known by class field theory that

$$\text{Gal}(K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K \cdot k^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty))$$

corresponds to

$$N_{K/k}^{-1}(k^\#(S'_\infty))/K^\#(S'_\infty)$$

by α_K where $k^\#(S'_\infty) = k^\# \cdot \prod_{\mathfrak{p} \in S'_\infty} k_{\mathfrak{p}}^\times$ and $k^\#$ is the kernel of the Artin map α_k of k . Therefore by α_K ,

$$(*) \quad \text{Gal}((K^{\text{ab}}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K^{\text{ab}}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_\infty))$$

is isomorphic to

$$\begin{aligned} & U'(K; S_0) \cdot K^\#(S'_\infty) \cap N_{K/k}^{-1}(k^\#(S'_\infty))/U'(K; S_0)^{d_{\mathfrak{g}}} \cdot K^\#(S'_\infty) \\ & \cong (U'(K; S_0) \cap N_{K/k}^{-1}(k^\#(S'_\infty))) \cdot K^\#(S'_\infty)/U'(K; S_0)^{d_{\mathfrak{g}}} \cdot K^\#(S'_\infty) \\ & \cong U'(K; S_0) \cap N_{K/k}^{-1}(k^\#(S'_\infty))/U'(K; S_0)^{d_{\mathfrak{g}}} \cdot (U'(K; S_0) \cap K^\#(S'_\infty)). \end{aligned}$$

LEMMA. (1) $U'(K; S_0)^{d_{\mathfrak{g}}} = U'(K; S_0) \cap N_{K/k}^{-1}(1)$.

(2) $U'(K; S_0) \cap K^\#(S'_\infty) = \mathcal{L}(K; S)$.

Proof. (1) Let \mathfrak{p} be a non-Archimedean prime divisor of k . The \mathfrak{p} -part of $U'(K; S_0)$ is trivial if $\mathfrak{p} \in S_0$ by definition. Suppose that $\mathfrak{p} \notin S_0$. Then \mathfrak{p} is unramified in K/k . Therefore $K_{\mathfrak{p}}/k_{\mathfrak{p}}$ is cyclic for $\mathfrak{p} \mid \mathfrak{p}$. The \mathfrak{p} -part of $U'(K; S_0)$ is $\mathcal{O}^\times(K \otimes_k k_{\mathfrak{p}})$. Fix a prime divisor \mathfrak{P} of \mathfrak{p} in K and denote the norm map of the local extension $K_{\mathfrak{P}}/k_{\mathfrak{p}}$ by $N_{\mathfrak{p}}$. Then it is clear that

$$N_{K/k}^{-1}(1) \cap \mathcal{O}^\times(K \otimes_k k_{\mathfrak{p}}) = \mathcal{O}^\times(K \otimes_k k_{\mathfrak{p}})^{d_{\mathfrak{g}}} \cdot (N_{\mathfrak{p}}^{-1}(1) \cap \mathcal{O}^\times(K_{\mathfrak{P}})).$$

Since $K_{\mathfrak{P}}/k_{\mathfrak{p}}$ is unramified, we have

$$N_{\mathfrak{p}}^{-1}(1) \cap \mathcal{O}^\times(K_{\mathfrak{P}}) = \mathcal{O}^\times(K_{\mathfrak{P}})^{d_{\mathfrak{g}}(\mathfrak{p})}$$

where $g(\mathfrak{p}) = \text{Gal}(K_{\mathfrak{p}}/k_{\mathfrak{p}}) \hookrightarrow g$ (cf. Iyanaga [I], Ch V, Th, 1.2). This shows that

$$N_{K/k}^{-1}(1) \cap \mathcal{O}^{\times}(K \otimes k_{\mathfrak{p}}) = \mathcal{O}^{\times}(K \otimes k_{\mathfrak{p}})^{d_{\mathfrak{p}}}$$

for every $\mathfrak{p} \notin S_0$, and proves (1).

(2) By Shimura [Sh], 2.2, we easily see that

$$K^{\#}(S'_{\infty}) = \bar{E}_0(K; S_{\infty}^K) \cdot K^{\times} \cdot (K_{\infty+}^{\times} \cdot \prod_{\mathfrak{p} \in S_{\infty}^K} K_{\mathfrak{p}}^{\times}).$$

Suppose that x is an element $U'(K; S_0) \cap K^{\#}(S'_{\infty})$ and $x = e \cdot a \cdot u$, $e \in \bar{E}_0(K; S_{\infty}^K)$, $a \in K^{\times}$, $u \in (K_{\infty+}^{\times} \cdot \prod K_{\mathfrak{p}}^{\times})$. Let $a = a_0 \cdot a_{\infty}$ be the decomposition of a in K_A^{\times} into its non-Archimedean part a_0 and its Archimedean part a_{∞} . Then $a_{\infty} \cdot u = 1$, and $x = e \cdot a_0 \in U'(K; S_0)$. Hence a is a unit of K such that $a \equiv u^{-1} \equiv 1 \pmod{\mathfrak{P}}$ for every $\mathfrak{P} \in S_{\infty}^K$, i.e. $a \in E(K; S_{\infty}^K)$. Therefore we have

$$x = e \cdot a_0 \in \bar{E}_0(K; S_{\infty}^K) \cap U'(K; S_0) = \mathcal{L}(K; S),$$

and proved that the left hand side of (2) lies in the right hand side. The converse inclusion is clear. The proof of the lemma is completed.

By this lemma, we see that the Galois group $(*)$ is isomorphic to the quotient group,

$$(**) \quad U'(K; S_0) \cap N_{K/k}^{-1}(k^{\#}(S'_{\infty})) / \mathcal{L}(K; S) \cdot (U'(K; S_0) \cap N_{K/k}^{-1}(1)).$$

This is isomorphically mapped by $N_{K/k}$ onto

$$N_{K/k}(U'(K; S_0) \cap k^{\#}(S'_{\infty})) / N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}(K; S)).$$

Since a non-Archimedean prime $\mathfrak{p} \notin S_0$ is unramified in K/k , we have

$$N_{K/k}(U'(K; S_0)) = U'(k; S_0).$$

By (2) of the above lemma for k in place of K , we have

$$U'(k; S_0) \cap k^{\#}(S'_{\infty}) = \mathcal{L}(k; S).$$

The proof of Theorem 1 is now completed by taking the p -primary parts.

§ 4. The main theorem

The maximal nilpotent extension of k which is unramified outside S is denoted by $k^{\text{nil}}(S)$.

THEOREM 2. *There exist surjective homomorphisms,*

$$\beta_{k,S}: \mathcal{L}(k; S) \longrightarrow \text{Gal}((k^{\text{nil}}(S)/k)^{\text{en}} \cap k^{\text{nil}}(\bar{S}_{\infty})/k^{\text{nil}}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}}(\bar{S}_{\infty})),$$

and

$$\beta_{k,S}^{(p)}: \mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S) \longrightarrow \text{Gal}((k^{(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap k^{(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)/k^{(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty))$$

the kernels of which are, respectively,

$$\text{Ker } \beta_{k,S} = \bigcap_{\substack{k \subset K \subset k^{\text{nil}}(S) \\ [K:k] < +\infty}} N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}(K; S)),$$

and

$$\text{Ker } \beta_{k,S}^{(p)} = \bigcap_{\substack{k \subset K \subset k^{(p)}(S) \\ [K:k] < +\infty}} N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(K; S)).$$

Furthermore, the following diagram is commutative for every finite Galois subextension K/k of $k^{(p)}(S)/k$:

$$\begin{array}{ccc} \mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S) & \xrightarrow{\beta_{k,S}^{(p)}} & \text{Gal}((k^{(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap k^{(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)/k^{(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)) \\ \downarrow \text{projection} & & \downarrow (\text{restriction}) \\ \mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)/N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(K; S)) & \xrightarrow{\sim} & \text{Gal}((K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)) \end{array}$$

where the last horizontal isomorphism is the one given by Theorem 1.

Proof. It is sufficient to show the p -case. (However it is to be noted that $K^{\text{ab}}(S)/k$ and $(K^{\text{ab}}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}}$ are not nilpotent extensions in general even if K/k is a p -extension.) Let K/k be a finite Galois subextension of $k^{(p)}(S)/k$. Then it is clear that

$$(K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty) \subset (k^{(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap k^{(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$$

and that

$$\begin{aligned} & (K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty) \cap (k^{(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)) \\ &= ((K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty) \cap k^{(p)}(S)) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty) \\ &= K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty). \end{aligned}$$

Therefore the natural homomorphism, (restriction) of the diagram (defined by taking the restrictions), is surjective.

Let x be an element of the field $(k^{(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap k^{(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$. Then $k(x)$ and its Galois closure F over k is a finite p -extension of k . Put $K = F \cap k^{(p)}(S)$. Since $F \cdot k^{(p)}(S)$ is an abelian extension of $k^{(p)}(S)$, it is clear that F is contained in $(K/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$ and hence also in $(K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$. This shows that the field $(k^{(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap k^{(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$ is the composition of all of $(K^{\text{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap K^{\text{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)$ for finite Galois subextensions K/k of $k^{(p)}(S)/k$.

Take another finite Galois subextension L/k of $k^{(p)}(S)/k$ and suppose that L contains K . Using the notation introduced in the proof of Theorem 1, denote the p -primary part of $(**)$ by $X(K/k)$, and also

$$\mathrm{Gal}((K^{\mathrm{ab}(p)}(S)/k)^{\mathrm{cen}} \cap K^{\mathrm{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty)/K^{\mathrm{ab}(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\mathrm{ab}(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty))$$

by $G(K/k)$ for simplicity. The pro- p -group $G(K/k)$ is canonically isomorphic to the p -primary part of the abelian profinite group $(*)$ in the proof of Theorem 1. We have the following diagram by class field theory:

$$\begin{array}{ccc} X(L/k) & \longrightarrow & G(L/k) \\ N_{L/K} \downarrow & & \downarrow \text{(restriction)} \\ X(K/k) & \longrightarrow & G(K/k). \end{array}$$

Since $N_{L/k} = N_{K/k} \circ N_{L/K}$, we have another commutative diagram,

$$\begin{array}{ccc} \mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)/N_{L/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(L; S)) & \xleftarrow{N_{L/k}} & X(L/k) \\ \text{projection} \downarrow & & \downarrow N_{L/K} \\ \mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)/N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(K; S)) & \xleftarrow{N_{K/k}} & X(K/k) \end{array}$$

where the left vertical homomorphism is the projection which is naturally defined because

$$N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(K; S)) \supset N_{L/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(L; S)).$$

Combining these two diagrams, we have two isomorphic projective systems $\{\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)/N_{K/k}(\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(K; S))\}$ and $\{G(K/k)\}$ both of which are parametrized by finite Galois subextensions K/k of $k^{(p)}(S)/k$. We now see Theorem 2 at once if we take the projective limits.

COROLLARY (Heider [H 2], Satz 10). *Suppose that the set S contains all of the real Archimedean prime divisors of k , i.e. $S_\infty \supset S_\infty^+(k)$. Then the Schur multiplier $H^2(\mathrm{Gal}(k^{\mathrm{nil}}(S)/k), \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z})$ is dual to $\mathcal{L}(k; S)/\mathrm{Ker} \beta_{k,S}$, and $H^2(\mathrm{Gal}(k^{(p)}(S)/k), \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z})$ to $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)/\mathrm{Ker} \beta_{k,S}^{(p)}$ for every prime p .*

Proof. By the assumption we have $k^{\mathrm{nil}}(\bar{S}_\infty) = k^{\mathrm{nil}}$, the maximal nilpotent extension of k , and $k^{(p)}(\bar{S}_\infty) = k^{(p)}$. Therefore we see the corollary by Theorem 2 in a similar way to the one explained in Introduction using the result of Tate and the Hochschild-Serre exact sequence.

§ 5. The case related to the Leopoldt conjecture

Here we take $S = S_0 \cup S_\infty$, $S_0 = \{p \in S_0(k) \mid p \nmid p\}$, $S_\infty = S_\infty^+(k)$, and denote the Leopoldt kernel $\mathcal{L}^{(p)}(k; S)$ simply by $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$.

LEMMA (Heider [H2], Lemma 10). *Let $k_\infty = \bigcup_{n=0}^\infty k_n$ be the cyclotomic \mathbf{Z}_p -extension of $k = k_0$. Then we have*

$$\bigcap_{n=1}^\infty N_{k_n/k}(\mathcal{L}_p(k_n)) = 1.$$

Proof. Heider [H2] showed the case where a primitive p -th root ζ_p or $\sqrt{-1}$ if $p = 2$ belongs to k . If not, put $k' = k(\zeta_p)$ or $k(\sqrt{-1})$. Then the cyclotomic \mathbf{Z}_p -extension $k'_\infty = \bigcup_{m=0}^\infty k'_m$ is the composite field $k' \cdot k_\infty$. It is easy to see that

$$N_{k_n/k}(\mathcal{L}_p(k_n)) \subset N_{k'_m/k'}(\mathcal{L}_p(k'_m))$$

if $k'_m = k' \cdot k_n$. Therefore we have

$$\bigcap_{n=1}^\infty N_{k_n/k}(\mathcal{L}_p(k_n)) \subset \bigcap_{m=1}^\infty N_{k'_m/k'}(\mathcal{L}_p(k'_m)) = 1. \quad \text{Q.E.D.}$$

Since the cyclotomic \mathbf{Z}_p -extension k_∞ of k is contained in $k^{(p)}(S)$ in our case here, we have by Theorem 2 and the corollary to it at once

THEOREM 3. *Let the notation and the assumptions be as above. There exists a natural isomorphism*

$$\beta_k^{(p)}: \mathcal{L}_p(k) \longrightarrow \text{Gal}((k^{(p)}(S)/k)^{\text{cen}} \cap k^{(p)}/k^{(p)}(S) \cdot k^{\text{ab}(p)}).$$

In particular, therefore, the Schur multiplier $H^2(\text{Gal}(k^{(p)}(S)/k), \mathbf{Q}/\mathbf{Z})$ is naturally dual to the Leopoldt kernel $\mathcal{L}_p(k)$.

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
