WIENER PAIRS OF MEASURE ALGEBRAS

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This article concerns the relationship between the spectral and the norm properties of certain subalgebras of the convolution measure algebra M(G) (Borel regular finite measures) on a locally compact amenable group G.

1. Introduction. In this paper we deal with the same general problem as in [2] and [4] which is concerned with the relationship of the spectrums of a C^* -enveloping algebra $C^*(A)$ of a subalgebra A of M(G). In different terminology this is the Wiener-Pitt phenomenon for A, i.e., whether the spectral radius of A is equal to the norm of the Fourier transform of A. Or in Y. Naimark's terminology whether A and $C^*(A)$ form a Wiener pair.

In the above mentioned works it has been examined for the case of compact non-Abelian groups G. Also the earlier paper [7] deals with the case of Abelian groups.

In the present work we examine this problem for amenable groups G for more general subalgebras of M(G) than those of [2] and [4]. Our methods here differ considerably from previous works. For example one can see that the proof of Theorem (2.6) doesn't make use of the properties of compact groups as Theorem (4.3) of [4].

In $\S 2$ we show that the Fourier norm of the direct sum of group algebras in M(G) coincides with the norm of the left regular representation of M(G) provided that G is an amenable group.

In §3 we deal with the equality of these norms for more general direct sum of group algebras and we discuss the problem of symmetric subalgebras of M(G). In particular in Theorem (3.3) we give conditions for the symmetry of certain subalgebras of M(G). The conditions involve the equality of the spectral radius with the Fourier norm as well as the equality of spectrums.

We begin in §2 with a brief presentation of the main definitions and symbols. For the general background, and for definitions and results not given explicit mention here, we refer to [1] and [3].

2. On the direct sum of group algebras. Throughout this work G_{τ} is a locally compact amenable group (see [5]) whose underlying abstract group is G and whose underlying topology is \mathcal{F}_{τ} .

The discrete group of G is denoted by G_d and the topological group with the initial (weak) topology is denoted for simplicity by G.

We shall denote by P, P_d and P_{τ} , the sets of all positive definite functions (p.d. functions) f such that f(e) = 1 (e being the unit of G) and f is continuous on G, G_d and G_{τ} respectively.

Let

$$\|\mu\|' = \sup_{f \in P} \left(\int_G f(t) d\mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu(t) \right)^{1/2}, \qquad \mu \in M(G),$$

be the norm in M(G) of the left regular representation on G, where by \cdot we denote the convolution multiplication and by $\mu \to \mu^{\sim}$ the usual involution on M(G).

The Fourier norm of a \sim subalgebra A of M(G) will be

$$\|\mu\|'_A = \sup \langle F, \mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu \rangle^{1/2}, \qquad \mu \in A,$$

where the supremum is taken over all positive forms F of A. For simplicity we denote by $\|\cdot\|'_{\tau}$ the norm $\|\cdot\|'_{L_1(G_{\tau})}$.

The next Lemma is the nondiscrete analogue case of Propositions (3.4) and (4.2) in [4].

LEMMA (2.1). If G_{τ} is an amenable group then for each $\mu \in L_1(G_{\tau})$, we have:

$$\|\mu\|_{\tau}' = \|\mu\|'.$$

In fact, since G_{τ} is amenable for any positive $v \in M(G_{\tau})$, $||v|| = ||v||'_{\tau}$ (see [6], Chapter 8, 3.6); thus if v is in $L_1(G_d)$, $||v|| = ||v||'_d$ and so G_d is amenable too. Since $L_1(G_{\tau})$ has an approximate identity each element μ of it can be approximated in the $||\cdot||'$ and $||\cdot||'_{\tau}$ norms by elements v of $L_1(G_d)$. By Proposition (3.4) of [4], we have $||v||'_{\tau} = ||v||'$ and so Lemma (2.1) follows.

We can easily see a partial converse of Lemma (2.1) in case where G is a locally compact nondiscrete group G which contains a free group F on two generators. In this case it is obvious that G and G_d are nonamenable. In fact if $1_F(x) = 1$ on F and 0 otherwise the equality of the norms $\|\cdot\|'$ and $\|\cdot\|'_d$ should imply that 1_F can be approximated on finite sets by continuous p.d. function φ with compact support. Let $K \subseteq F$ be finite and $\varepsilon > 0$; there exists a φ as above such that

 $|1_F(x) - \varphi(x)| < \varepsilon$, $x \in K$. But this implies that F is amenable—contradiction.

As an example consider G = SL(2, R) and F any free subgroup of it.

For the rest of this section let A be the algebra $L_1(G_\tau) \oplus L_1(G)$. It is easy to see that $L_1(G)$ is a two sided ideal in A. Let f be a positive form on $L_1(G)$, i.e., for any $\mu \in L_1(G)$ $\langle f, \mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu \rangle \geq 0$, and π be the corresponding representation of $L_1(G)$ on a Hilbert space H, i.e., $f(\mu) = \langle \pi(\mu)\xi, \xi \rangle, \xi \in H$. It is elementary to see that:

LEMMA (2.2). There exists a representation π' which extends π on A, such that $\pi(L_1(G))$ is strongly dense in $\pi'(A)$.

Proof. Given any $\mu \in L_1(G)$ such that $f(\mu) \neq 0$ we consider the positive form $f'(v) = f(\mu^{\sim} \cdot v \cdot \mu)$ on $A(v \in A)$. Now let π' be the representation on a Hilbert space H' corresponding to f'. For any $v \in L_1(G)$:

$$f'(v) = \langle \pi'(v)\pi'(\mu)\xi', \pi'(\mu)\xi' \rangle = \langle \pi(v)\pi(\mu)\xi, \pi(\mu)\xi \rangle.$$

Thus we may assume that π is the restriction of π' on H and that f can be extended to a positive form f' on A. The density of $\pi(L_1(G))$ in H' is due to the fact that $L_1(G)$ is an ideal with an approximate identity.

NOTATION. Given a positive form f in $L_1(G)$, we shall denote by f_{\sim} a corresponding continuous p.d. function on G and by f' the following positive form on $L^{\infty}(G_{\tau})$:

$$f'(\mu) = \int f_{\sim}(t) d\mu(t), \qquad \mu \in L_1(G_{\tau}).$$

LEMMA (2.3). Let $(f_i)_{i\in I}$ be a net of positive forms on $L_1(G)$ which converges weak* in $L^{\infty}(G_{\tau})$ to g'.

Proof. Let π be the representation on $L_1(G)$, associated with g. Since $L_1(G)$ is a two sided ideal in A, there is a unique extension π' of π on A such that $\pi(L_1(G))$ is strongly and so weakly dense in $\pi'(A)$ (Lemma (2.2)). Thus given $\varepsilon > 0$ and $\mu \in L_1(G_\tau)$, there is a $v \in L_1(G)$ such that

$$(1) |g'(\mu) - g(v)| < \varepsilon;$$

also for any $i \in I$

(2)
$$|f_i'(\mu) - g'(v)| \le |f_i'(\mu) - f_i(v)| + |f_i(v) - g(v)| + |g(v) - g'(\mu)|$$

Since f_i converges to g, by (1) there is an i_0 such that for $i \ge i_0$,

$$|f_i(v) - g(v)| + |g(v) - g'(\mu)| < 2\varepsilon.$$

Hence (2) depends only on the first term of the right hand side. Let now F_i be the extension of f_i on $A \cdot i \in I$; we consider the cases that either for some $i \geq i_0$, $|F_i(\mu - v)| < \varepsilon$ or not. In the first case it follows from (2) and (3) that for some $i \geq i_0$

$$|f_i'(\mu) - g(\mu)| < \varepsilon.$$

In the second case we observe that the set $(F_i)_{i\geq i_0}$ is in a compact subset of the dual of A in the weak* topology. Hence there is a subnet of $(f_i)_i$, which converges in the weak* topology of $L^{\infty}(G_{\tau})$ to g'. Thus for some i, we obtain (4) and this completes the proof.

LEMMA (2.4). Let $f \in P$. Then f can be approximated in the uniform topology on compact sets on G_{τ} by elements of $P_{\tau} \setminus P$.

Proof. Let K be a compact set in G_{τ} ; without loss of generality we may assume that K has nonempty interior. We shall show that f coincides in K with an element $g \in P_{\tau} \setminus P$.

First observe that the group GpK generated by K in G_{τ} cannot be all the group G. Because in this case, the topologies of G and G_{τ} would coincide. We consider the following p.d. function g(t) on G: g(t) = f(t) when $t \in GpK$ and g(t) = 0 otherwise.

Since GpK is open and f is continuous on G_{τ} , the set

$$\{t: |g(t) - 1| < \varepsilon\} = \{t: |f(t) - 1| < \varepsilon\} \cap GpK$$

is open in G_{τ} . Thus g being continuous at e is continuous in G_{τ} . It is easy to see that g is discontinuous at G. Thus g coincides with F on K and $g \in P_{\tau} \backslash P$.

LEMMA (2.5). Let $(F_i)_{i\in I}$ be a net of positive forms on A such that for any $i \in I$, $F_i/L_1(G) = f_i \neq 0$. Let $F_i/L_1(G_\tau) = f_i'$, $i \in I$, and suppose that (f_i') converges in the weak* topology of $L^{\infty}(G_\tau)$ to some positive form \mathbf{g} such that g is discontinuous in G. Then there is a subnet of $(f_i)_i$ which converges weak* in $L^{\infty}(G)$ to 0.

Proof. We suppose that there exists a $\mu \in L_1(G)$ and a c > 0 such that for some $i_0 \in I$, and any $i \ge i_0$, $|f_i(\mu)| \ge c$. It is clear that the

set $(f_i)_{i\geq i_0}$ is in a weak* compact subset of $L^\infty(G)$. Thus this net has a convergent subnet with limit (say) h. By Lemma (2.5) there exists a subnet of $(f_i')_i$ which converges weak* in $L^\infty(G_\tau)$ to h'. Clearly g=h and so g is G_τ -continuous—contradiction. Thus for any c>0 and any $i_0\in I$ there is an $i\geq i_0$, such that $|f_i(\mu)|< c$ and so there is a subnet as we claimed.

THEOREM (2.6). For any $\mu \in A$ (provided that G_{τ} is amenable)

$$\|\mu\|_A' = \|\mu\|'.$$

Proof. Let $\mu = \mu_{\tau} + \mu_{\alpha}$ where $\mu_{\tau} \in L_1(G_{\tau})$ and $\mu_{\alpha} \in L_1(G)$. Let also $\varepsilon > 0$ is given. There exists a positive form F on A such that

$$(\|\mu\|')^2 < \langle F, \mu^{\sim} * \mu \rangle + \varepsilon.$$

Let f an f' be the p.d. functions corresponding to $F/L_1(G)$ and $F/L_1(G_\tau)$ respectively. We consider the following cases:

- (a) $f \neq 0$ and so f is continuous in G.
- (b) f = 0.

If F is as in case (b), then by Lemma (2.1) and Lemma (2.3), there is a positive form H, $H/L_1(G) = 0$ such that if h is the corresponding continuous p.d. function on G_{τ} , we have

(2)
$$\left| \int f'(t) d\mu_{\tau}^{\sim} * \mu_{\tau}(t) - \int h(t) d\mu_{\tau}^{\sim} \cdot \mu_{\tau} \right| < \varepsilon.$$

From (1) and (2) it is clear that

$$(\|\mu\|_{A}^{\prime})^{2} \leq \langle H, \mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu \rangle + \varepsilon \leq (\|\mu\|^{\prime})^{2} + 2\varepsilon,$$

and so since ε is arbitrarily small

$$\|\mu\|_A' \le \|\mu\|'.$$

If F is as in case (a) then from (1) we obtain (4). Since $\|\cdot\| \le \|\cdot\|'_4$, the norms are as we claimed.

3. Symmetric subalgebras. In this section we consider a more general direct sum of group subalgebras of M(G). We shall establish, as in §2 the equality of Fourier norms and discuss the problem of the symmetry.

Let G be a nondiscrete locally compact group and $(\mathscr{F}_{\tau})_{\tau \in V}$ be a collection of distinct locally compact topologies on the group G such that V is a semi-lattice (inclusion ordered). For any $\tau, \sigma \in V$ there exists $\tau \cap \sigma \in V$ such that $\tau \cap \sigma \leq \tau$ and $\tau \cap \sigma \leq \sigma$ and $\mathscr{F}_{\tau \cap \sigma} = \mathscr{F}_{\tau} \cap \mathscr{F}_{\sigma}$.

Assume that $o \in V$ is the minimum of V, i.e., G_o is the initial topology. Assume also that $d \in V$ corresponds to the discrete topology. For any $\tau \in V$, we denote by G_{τ} the group G with the topology \mathscr{F}_{τ} . For simplicity we write G instead of G_o .

As in [7] we observe that the algebra $L_V = \bigoplus_{\tau \in V} L_1(G_\tau)$ is a closed subalgebra of M(G). It is clear that $L_1(G)$ is a two sided ideal in L_V and so any positive form on $L_1(G)$ has a unique extension on L_V . We shall show now that the Fourier norm $\|\cdot\|_V'$ on L_V , coincides with the $\|\cdot\|'$ norm.

LEMMA 3.1. Let $\tau, \kappa_1, \ldots, \kappa_p \in V$ such that $\tau \not\leq q$, $q = \kappa_1, \ldots, \kappa_p$. If h is a positive form on $L_1(G_\tau)$, then there is a net $(F_i)_{i\in I}$ of positive forms of norm one on $L_V \colon F_i/L_1(G) \neq 0$, and $F_i \to 0$, $i \in I$, weak* in $L^\infty(G_q)$, $q = \kappa_1, \ldots, \kappa_p$ and $F_i \to h$, $i \in I$, weak* in $L^\infty(G_\tau)$.

Proof. Let $m = \min\{\tau, \kappa_1, \dots, \kappa_p\}$. Then since P is dense in P_{τ} by Lemma (2.5), there is a net of positive forms $(F_i)_{i \in I}$ such that $F_i \to h$, $i \in I$ weak* in $L^{\infty}(G_m)$.

We suppose that there is no subnet of it satisfying the Lemma and so we assume that for some $q = \kappa_1, \ldots, \kappa_p, c \ge 0$ and $\mu \in L_1(G_q), |F_i(\mu)| \ge 2c, i \in I$.

This set is weak* compact and so it has a subnet converging to some positive form F. It is clear that $|F(\mu)| \ge 2c$ and we may write:

(1)
$$|F_i(\mu) - F(\mu)| < c/3, \quad i \ge i_0, \ i_0 \in I.$$

If $q < \tau$, (1) contradicts with Lemma (2.5), so without loss of generality we may assume that $m = \min(q, \tau)$.

Let $(v_j)_{j\in J}$ be an approximate identity in $L_1(G_m)$. On $L_1(G_q)\oplus L_1(G_m)$ the Fourier norm coincides with the $\|\cdot\|'$ norm and since $\|v_j\cdot\mu^\sim\cdot\mu\|'\to 0,\ j\in J$, we obtain $F_i((v_j\cdot\mu^\sim\cdot\mu)^\sim\cdot(v_j\cdot\mu^\sim\cdot\mu))\to 0,\ j\in J$, for each $i\in I$. Hence exists some $j_0\in J$ such that for each $i\in I$

(2)
$$|F_i(v_j \cdot \mu) - F_i(\mu)| < c/3, \quad j \ge j_0.$$

Now, $v_j \cdot \mu \in L_1(G_m)$ and $F_i(v_j \cdot \mu) \to 0$, $i \in I$; thus for some $i \ge i_0$, $i'_0 \in I$.

$$|F_i(v_j \cdot \mu)| < c/3.$$

From (1), (2) and (3) we obtain $|F(\mu)| < c$ —contradiction.

Proposition (3.2). For any $\mu \in L_V$ (provided that G_d is amenable) $\|\mu\|_V' = \|\mu\|'$.

Proof. It suffices to show that any positive form H on L_V is the weak* limit of positive forms F such that $F/L_1(G) \neq 0$ provided that the norms of H and F's are one.

Since finite sums $\sum_{\tau \in V} \mu_{\tau}$, where $\mu_{\tau} \in L_1(G_{\tau})$, are dense in L_V we show that given $\varepsilon > 0$, $\mu_{k_i} \in L_1(G_{k_i})$ (i = 1, ..., n) there exists a positive form F, as above, such that

$$|H(\mu_{k_i}) - F(\mu_{k_i})| < \varepsilon$$
 $(i = 1, \ldots, n).$

Let m be the minimum index in V such that $H/L_1(G_m) \neq 0$. We consider the following cases:

- 1. $m \leq \min(\kappa_1, \dots, \kappa_n)$. We apply Lemmas (2.1) and (2.5).
- 2. $m \le \min(\kappa_1, ..., \kappa_s)$ and $q \not\le \kappa_{s+1}, ..., \kappa_n$ $(1 < s \le n)$. In this case we apply Lemma (4.1) for the set of indexes $m, \kappa_{s+1}, ..., \kappa_n$, and we continue as in Case 1. Thus the weak* limit of F's to H implies that $\|\cdot\|_V' = \|\cdot\|'$ on L_V .

We recall that a Banach algebra A with an involution $\mu \to \mu^{\sim}$ is symmetric if $\operatorname{sp}(\mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu) \subseteq \mathbf{R}^+$, for any $\mu \in A$. In [4] we have seen the following result on general Banach algebras. If A is a Banach-algebra with identity, and $\varphi \colon A \to C^*(A)$ is the natural homomorphism of A in the enveloping C^* algebra of A, and $\rho(\cdot)$ is the spectral radius, then if $\mu \in A$ the next conditions are equivalent:

- (i) A is symmetric,
- (ii) sp $\mu = \text{sp}(\varphi(\mu))$,
- (iii) $\rho(\mu) = \rho(\varphi(\mu)),$
- (iv) $\rho(\mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu) = \|\varphi(\mu)\|^2$.

Now let A be the algebra L_V . Then $\|\varphi(\mu)\| = \|\mu\|_V'$, $\mu \in L_V$, and so by Proposition (3.2) we establish a Theorem:

Theorem (3.3). Provided that G_d is amenable and $\mu \in L_V$, we have the following equivalent conditions:

- (i) L_V is symmetric,
- (ii) $\operatorname{sp} \mu = \operatorname{sp} \varphi(\mu)$,
- (iii) $\rho(\mu) = \|\mu\|',$
- (iv) $\rho(\mu^{\sim} \cdot \mu)^{1/2} = \|\mu\|'$.

For the relation between amenable and Hermitian groups G we refer to [5] (G is hermitian iff $L_1(G)$ is a symmetric algebra).

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
