

Editor's Note Regarding the Interview with Professor David Kendall, August 1996 Issue

In an interview a speaker's words can be interpreted in ways not intended by the speaker. While it is the editors' responsibility to bring attention to obvious cases of this kind prior to publication, this was not done due to oversight with respect to the two particular lines in the interview with Professor David Kendall in the August 1996 issue of this journal. These lines appear at the bottom of page 174 where Professor Kendall wanted to note that Michel

Loeve had been more fortunate than most others who had been deported to concentration camps during World War II. Professor Kendall indicated to me that he certainly did not intend to minimize the unfortunate fate of practically all deportees and has written to apologize unreservedly. The editors regret the pain caused to many of our readers and to Professor Kendall resulting from this editorial oversight.
