# ON A FRAMEWORK OF SCATTERING FOR DISSIPATIVE SYSTEMS 

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(Received September 5, 2001)

## 1. Introduction

In this paper we study the existence of scattering solutions for some dissipative systems which contain elastic wave with dissipative boundary conditions in a half space of $\mathbf{R}^{3}$ (cf. Dermenjian-Guillot [1]). First we give a framework based on the idea of Simon [18] and apply it to elastic wave mentioned above. In applying the abstract framework, we shall use the Mellin transformation (cf. Perry [14]) as a key tool.

Let $\mathcal{H}$ be separable Hilbert space with inner $\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle_{\mathcal{H}}$. The norm is denoted by $\|\cdot\|_{\mathcal{H}}$. Let $\{V(t)\}_{t \geqq 0}$ and $\left\{U_{0}(t)\right\}_{t \in \mathbf{R}}$ be a contraction semi- group in $\mathcal{H}$ and a unitary group in $\mathcal{H}_{0}$, respectively. We denote the generator of $V(t)$ and $U_{0}(t)$ by $A$ and $A_{0}$, respectively $\left(V(t)=e^{-i t A}\right.$ and $\left.U_{0}(t)=e^{-i t A_{0}}\right)$. We make the following assumptions on $A$ and $A_{0}$.
(A1) $\sigma\left(A_{0}\right)=\sigma_{a c}\left(A_{0}\right)=\mathbf{R}$ or $[0, \infty)$.
(A2) $(A-i)^{-1}-\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}$ defined as a form is extended to a compact operator $K$ in $\mathcal{H}$.
(A3) There exist non-zero projection operators in $\mathcal{H}, P_{+}$and $P_{-}$, such that $P_{+}+P_{-}=$ $I_{d}$ and

for each $\psi \in C_{0}^{\infty}(\mathbf{R} \backslash 0)$ and $\left\{f_{t}\right\}_{t \in \mathbf{R}}$ satisfying $\sup _{t \in \mathbf{R}}\left\|f_{t}\right\|_{\mathcal{H}}<\infty$, where $\|\cdot\|$ is the operator norm of bounded operators in $\mathcal{H}$.
(A3.1), (A3.3) and (A3.4) will imply the existence of the wave operator. It will follow from (A3.2) that the wave operator is not zero as an operator in $\mathcal{H}$. The framework of [18] is due to Enss's method [2]. In order to cheak the applicability of the framework of [18] to dissipative systems (see also Stefanov-Georgiev [20] or [15]), we
have to show the following type limit:

for some one parameter compact operators, $\{\tilde{K}(t)\}_{t \in[0, \infty)}$, in $\mathcal{H}$, where $t_{n}$ is as in (F2) below. This follows from Lebesgue's theorem and

(A3.1)~(A3.3) mean (1.2) (for details, see $\S 2$ ).
Let $\mathcal{H}_{b}$ be the space generated by the eigenvectors of $A$ with real eigenvalues. We use the following facts (see Simon [18] and Petkov [15]):
(F1) $\left\{(A-i)^{-2} A f \in \mathcal{H}: f \in D(A) \cap \mathcal{H}_{b}^{\perp}\right\}$ is dense in $\mathcal{H}_{b}^{\perp}$.
(F2) There exists a sequence $\left\{t_{n}\right\}$ such that

In this abstract framework, we shall show
Theorem 1. Assume that (A1) ~ (A3). Then for any $f \in \mathcal{H}_{b}^{\perp}$, the wave operator

exists. Moreover $W$ is not zero as an operator from $\mathcal{H}_{b}^{\perp}$ to $\mathcal{H}$.
As a corollary of Theorem 1, we can find scattering solutions of $d(V(t) f) / d t=$ $-i A V(t) f, f \in D(A)$.

Corollary 2. Assume that (A1) ~ (A3). Then there exist non-trivial initial data $f \in \mathcal{H}$ and $f_{+} \in \mathcal{H}$ such that for any $k=0,1,2, \ldots$, and $\zeta_{0} \in \mathbf{C}$ satisfying $\Re \zeta_{0}>0$

We can also obtain the standard result concerning real eigenvalues of $A$ as follows.

Theorem 3. Any non-zero eigenvalues of $A$ has finite multiplicity. Moreover the possible finite accumulation point of the real eigenvalues of $A$ is zero.

In $\S 2$ we shall give the proof of Theorem 1, Corollary 2 and Theorem 3.
In $\S 3$ we shall apply our framework to (1.3) as below, which describes elastic wave with dissipative boundary conditions in a half space of $\mathbf{R}^{3}$. It seems that there is no work concerning dissipative elastic wave in a half space (cf. Theorem 3.1).

Let $x=\left(x_{1}, x_{2}, x_{3}\right)=\left(y, x_{3}\right) \in \mathbf{R}^{2} \times \mathbf{R}_{+}, \rho_{0}>0, \mu_{0}>0$ and $\lambda_{0} \in \mathbf{R}$ satisfying $3 \lambda_{0}+$ $2 \mu_{0}>0$. We use $O_{3 \times 3}$ and $I_{3 \times 3}$ as zero and unit matrix of $3 \times 3$ type, respectively.

We set

where $h, j=1,2,3, u(x)=^{t}\left(u_{1}(x), u_{2}(x), u_{3}(x)\right) \in \mathbf{C}^{3}$ and $\nabla_{x}=\left(\partial / \partial_{1}, \partial / \partial_{2}, \partial / \partial_{3}\right)$.
We define operators $\tilde{L}_{0}$ as

We consider two elastic wave equations as follows:

To state assumptions for $\lambda(x), \mu(x)$ and $B(y)$ we introduce a function space $B^{k}(\Omega)$ as follows:

where $\varphi(r)$ is a non-increasing function and belongs to $L^{1}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}\right)$, and $\mathbf{M}_{3 \times 3}$ is the totality of $3 \times 3$ matrix.

The following operator $L_{0}$ in $\mathcal{G}=L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3} ; \rho_{0} d x\right)$ :

is a non-negative and self-adjoint. In the Appendix we state basic results on $L_{0}$

Remark 1.1. We can also deal with the perturbation of $\lambda_{0}, \mu_{0}$ and $\rho_{0}$ as follows: $\lambda(x)$ and $\mu(x)$ belong to $B^{1}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}\right) . \rho(x)$ belongs to $L^{\infty}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}\right)$. Moreover these functions satisfy

for some $M, m>0$ and

The projections $P_{ \pm}$in (A3) are considered by using the generalized Fourier transformation for $L_{0}$ and the negative (or positive) spectral projections of generators of dilation of $\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}$ and $\mathbf{R}^{2}$. To make a check on (A3.1)~(A3.3) we use the Mellin transformation of $\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}$ (resp. $\mathbf{R}^{2}$ ) in the range space of the generalized Fourier transformation of free waves (resp. Rayleigh wave). Perry [14] is the first to apply the Mellin transformation to show asymptotic completeness for Schrödinger equation. Kadowaki [6] has also used the Mellin transformation with the generalized eigenfunction expansion theorem of Wilcox [22] or Weder [21]. Recently, Soga [19] has considered the scattering theory of Lax-Phillips (cf. Lax-Phillips [11]) for (1.4). However (1.3) has not been dealt with.
[18], [20] and [15] have directly showed (1.1) by using pseudo-differential operator and the relation

and $\mathfrak{F}$ is the Fourier transformation. If we directly apply the framework of [18] to dissipative elastic wave in a half space, we have to require (1.6) to hold for the general-
ized Fourier transformation for elastic wave in a half space. But it is not clear. Therefore it seems difficult to directly apply the framework of [18] to elastic wave with dissipative boundary conditions in a half space. We can also deal with dissipative elastic wave equation in stratified (two layered) media (cf. Shimizu [17]) by our framework. As other applications (cf. §3) of our framework, we consider Schödinger equation with complex valued potential (cf. [18]) and acoustic wave equation with dissipative term in inhomogeneous media (cf. Mochizuki [13]). These applications are essentially the same results as in [18] and [13]. Although we do not pick up the exterior domain problem (for instance [11] and [20]), we can also treat them with some modifications.

Kadowaki [7] has considered the existence of scattering solution for acoustic wave equation with dissipative term in special stratified media. This equation is not included in our example. The reason is that, since the generalized eigenfunction of acoustic wave operator has singular points due to the thresholds (see [22] or [21]), the key estimate (cf. Lemma 3.2) of the neighborhood of each threshold (for detail, see [6, Lemma 2.1]) is hard to prove. In [7], Mochizuki's work [13] was used instead. His framework is based on resolvent estimates and Kato's smooth perturbation theory (cf. Kato [9]). In Kadowaki [8], we extended Mochizuki's framework and apply that to dissipative wave equations in stratified media which was not treated by [7].

Finally we give brief comments concerning energy decay solutions:

In the proof of $W \not \equiv 0$, we have to note the existence of energy decay solutions, for details see $\S 2$ (cf. Georgiev [3], Majda [12], [15] and [20]).

## 2. Proof of Theorem 1, Corollary 2 and Theorem 3

In this section we deal with the case $\sigma\left(A_{0}\right)=\sigma_{a c}\left(A_{0}\right)=\mathbf{R}$ only. In the same way, another case can be dealt with. We set $F(\lambda)=(\lambda-i)^{-2} \lambda$ and $W(t)=U_{0}(-t) V(t)$. In this section $C$ is used as positive constants.

Below we shall give the proof of Theorem 1. First we prove the existence of $W$ by referring to Enss [2], Simon [18], Kuroda [10], Perry [14], Isozaki-Kitada [4], Stefanov-Georgiev [20] and Petkov [15]. But we sometimes omit to note the above references.

Proof of the existence of $W$. For any $f \in \mathcal{H}_{b}^{\perp} \cap D(A)$ and $t, s>t_{n}$, note (F1) and

First, we note that for any $\varepsilon$, there exists $M>0$ such that

are proved, we obtain (2.1). Below we shall show (2.2). For $j=1$, note $F(\lambda)=$ $i(\lambda-i)^{-2}+(\lambda-i)^{-1}$. Therefore (A2) implies that $F(A)^{2}-F\left(A_{0}\right)^{2}$ is also a compact operator in $\mathcal{H}$. Using (F2) we have

& T_{51}=\left\langle\psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{-} h_{n},\left(F\left(A_{0}\right)-F(A)\right) V\left(t_{n}\right) f\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}} \\
& T_{52}=\left\langle\psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{-} h_{n},\left(V\left(t_{n}\right)-U_{0}\left(t_{n}\right)\right) F(A) f\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}} \\
& T_{53}=\left\langle U_{0}\left(-t_{n}\right) \psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{-} h_{n}, F(A) f\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}}
\end{aligned}
$$

and $h_{n}=\left(F \psi_{M}\right)\left(A_{0}\right) V\left(t_{n}\right) f$.
Note that

\left|T_{51}\right| \leqq C\left\|\left(F\left(A_{0}\right)-F(A)\right) V\left(t_{n}\right) f\right\|_{\mathcal{H}} .

Thus (A2) and (F2) imply

To estimate $T_{52}$, again we use Cook-Kuroda method. Note that

& \left.\quad-\left\langle A_{0} U_{0}(-s) \psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{-} h_{n}, V\left(t_{n}-s\right) F(A) f\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}}\right) d s \\
= & i \int_{0}^{t_{n}}\left\langle V^{*}\left(t_{n}-s\right) A^{*}\left(A^{*}+i\right)^{-1} K^{*} U_{0}(-s) \bar{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{-} h_{n}, f\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}} d s .
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus we have

Using (A2), (F2) and (A3.2) we have by Lebesgue's theorem

Therefore the proof of the existence of $W$ is completed.
To show $W \not \equiv 0$, we introduce a subspace of $\mathcal{H}, D$, as follows:

Hence we obtain (2.3) by (2.4) and (2.5).

Below we shall show $W \not \equiv 0$ (cf. Mochizuki [13] §3).
Proof of $W \not \equiv 0$. For any $f \in \mathcal{H}$ and $g \in \mathcal{H}_{0}$, note that

We assume that $W \equiv 0$, i.e., for any $f \in \mathcal{H}_{b}^{\perp}$,

(2.7) means

Hence Proposition 2.1 and (2.6) imply

for any $h \in \mathcal{H}$, we have

& \left\langle\left((A-i)^{-1}-\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}\right) U_{0}(s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h, U_{0}(s) \psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}} \\
& \quad+\left\|\psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h\right\|_{\mathcal{H}}^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

$$
=-i \int_{0}^{\infty}\left\langle V(\tau) U_{0}(s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h, K^{*} U_{0}(\tau+s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h,\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}} d \tau
$$

It follows from the above identity that

\left\|\psi_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h\right\|_{\mathcal{H}}^{2} \leqq & \|h\|_{\mathcal{H}}\left\{\left\|\left((A-i)^{-1}-\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}\right) U_{0}(s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h\right\|_{\mathcal{H}}\right. \\
& \left.+C_{M} \int_{0}^{\infty}\left\|K^{*} U_{0}(\tau+s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h\right\|_{\mathcal{H}} d \tau\right\}
\end{aligned}
$$

(A1) and (A2) imply

$$
\lim _{s \rightarrow \infty}\left\|\left((A-i)^{-1}-\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}\right) U_{0}(s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+} h\right\|_{\mathcal{H}}=0
$$

(A3.2) implies

\lim _{s \rightarrow \infty} \int_{0}^{\infty}\left\|K^{*} U_{0}(\tau+s) \tilde{\psi}_{M}\left(A_{0}\right) P_{+}\right\| d \tau=0
$$

Therefore we have

for any $h \in \mathcal{H}_{0}$ and any $M>0$.
(2.8) implies $P_{+} \equiv 0$. This is a contradiction with (A3). Now the proof of $W \not \equiv 0$ is completed.

In the remainder of this section we show Corollary 2 and Theorem 3.

Proof of Corollary 2. First we consider the case $k=0$. Since $U_{0}(t)$ is unitary in $\mathcal{H}$, it follows from Theorem 1 that there exist non-trivial initial data $f \in \mathcal{H}$ such that $W f \neq 0$ and

Setting $f_{+}=W f$ we have Corollary 2 for $k=0$. Next we consider $k=1$. Corollary 2 for $k=0$ and (A1) imply

\end{aligned}
$$

we have Corollary 2 for $k=1$ by (A2), (2.9) and Corollary 2 for $k=0$.
The cases $k \geqq 2$ can be proved by induction, which is omittied.
The proof of Theorem 3 is similar to that of Theorem 1. So we shall give a brief sketch of the proof only.

Proof of Theorem 3. Assume that there exist $f_{n} \in D(A), \lambda_{n}, \lambda \in \mathbf{R} \backslash 0(n=1,2$, $3, \ldots$ ) such that

The argument as in [15] (see the proof of Theorem 3.6.4) implies

Therefore the proof is complete.

## 3. Applications

In this section we apply our framework to elastic wave equation with dissipative boundary condition in a half space of $\mathbf{R}^{3}$, Schrödinger equation with complex valued potential and acoustic wave equation with dissipative term. We also use $C$ as positive constants.

## Application 1 (Elastic wave equation with dissipative boundary condition in a half space of $\mathbf{R}^{\mathbf{3}}$ )

Let $\mathcal{H}$ be the Hilbert space with inner product:

$$

where $a_{h j k l}=\lambda_{0} \delta_{h j} \delta_{k l}+\mu_{0}\left(\delta_{h k} \delta_{j l}+\delta_{h l} \delta_{j k}\right)$ and $f={ }^{t}\left(f_{1}, f_{2}\right), g={ }^{t}\left(g_{1}, g_{2}\right)$. Korn's inequality (cf. Ito [5]) implies that $\mathcal{H}$ is equivalent to $\dot{H}^{1}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right) \times L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right)$ as Banach space.

We set $f={ }^{t}\left(u(x, t), u_{t}(x, t)\right)$, where $u(x, t)$ is the solution to (1.3) (resp. (1.4)) with initial data $f_{0}=^{t}\left(u(x, 0), u_{t}(x, 0)\right) \in \mathcal{H}$. Then (1.3) (resp. (1.4)) can be written as

\partial_{t} f=-i A f \quad\left(\text { resp. } \quad \partial_{t} f=-i A_{0} f\right)
$$

where

\begin{gather*}
A=i\left(\begin{array}{cc}
0 & I_{3 \times 3} \\
-\tilde{L}_{0} & 0
\end{array}\right), \quad A_{0}=i\left(\begin{array}{cc}
0 & I_{3 \times 3} \\
-\tilde{L}_{0} & 0
\end{array}\right),  \tag{3.1}\\
D(A)=\left\{f={ }^{t}\left(f_{1}, f_{2}\right) \in \mathcal{H} ; \tilde{L}_{0} f_{1} \in L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right), f_{2} \in H^{1}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right),\right. \\
\left.\left.{ }^{t}\left(\sigma_{13}\left(f_{1}\right), \sigma_{23}\left(f_{1}\right), \sigma_{33}\left(f_{1}\right)\right)\right|_{x_{3}=0}=\left.B(y) f_{2}\right|_{x_{3}=0}\right\}
\end{gather*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{aligned}
D\left(A_{0}\right)=\{ & f={ }^{t}\left(f_{1}, f_{2}\right) \in \mathcal{H} ; \tilde{L}_{0} f_{1} \in L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right), f_{2} \in H^{1}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right), \\
& \left.\left.\sigma_{h 3}\left(f_{1}\right)\right|_{x_{3}=0}=0(h=1,2,3)\right\}
\end{aligned}
$$

According to Lax-Phillips [11, P210-P211] or Petkov [15, Corollary 1.1.4] we can show that $A$ (resp. $A_{0}$ ) generates a contraction semi-group $\{V(t)\}_{t \geqq 0}$ (resp. a unitary group $\left.\left\{U_{0}(t)\right\}_{t \in \mathbf{R}}\right)$ in $\mathcal{H}$. Using $\{V(t)\}_{t \geqq 0}$ (resp. $\left.\left\{U_{0}(t)\right\}_{t \in \mathbf{R}}\right)$ we solve $\partial_{t} f=-i A f$ (resp. $\partial_{t} f=-i A_{0} f$ ) as follows:

f=V(t) f_{0} \quad\left(\text { resp. } f=U_{0}(t) f_{0}\right)
$$

Moreover we have the following.

Theorem 3.1. For $A_{0}$ and $A$ as in (3.1), one has the conclusions as in Theorem 1, Corollary 2 and Theorem 3.

To show this theorem, we prove (A1), (A2) and (A3) in Lemma 3.2, 3.3 and Proposition 3.4, respectively.

Lemma 3.2. $A_{0}$ from (3.1) satisfies (A1).
Proof. Lemma A of the Appendix implies $\sigma\left(A_{0}\right)=\sigma_{a c}\left(A_{0}\right)=\mathbf{R}$ (see also [1]).

Lemma 3.3. $A_{0}$ and $A$ from (3.1) satisfy (A2).

Proof. Note that

& \left\langle\left((A-i)^{-1}-\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}\right) f, g\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}} \\
& \quad=\left\langle A_{0}\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1} f,\left(A^{*}+i\right)^{-1} g\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}}-\left\langle\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1} f, A^{*}\left(A^{*}+i\right)^{-1} g\right\rangle_{\mathcal{H}}
\end{aligned}
$$

for $f, g \in \mathcal{H}$. By easy calculation we have

& \quad=i \int_{\mathbf{R}^{2}} B(y) \Gamma_{0}\left(\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1} f\right)_{2} \overline{\Gamma_{0}\left(\left(A^{*}+i\right)^{-1} g\right)_{2}} d y
\end{align*}
$$

where $\Gamma_{0}$ is a trace operator defined by

For any $s \in(1 / 2,1)$, Korn's inequality implies that $\Gamma_{0}\left(\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1} f\right)_{2}$ and $\Gamma_{0}\left(\left(A^{*}+i\right)^{-1} f\right)_{2}$ belong to $H^{1-s}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right)$. Since $B(y) \Gamma_{0} \Pi_{2}\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}$ is a compact operator from $\mathcal{H}$ to $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}^{2}, \mathbf{C}^{3}\right)$ by Rellich's theorem, where $\Pi_{j}{ }^{t}\left(f_{1}, f_{2}\right)=f_{j}$ ( $j=1,2$ ), the form $(A-i)^{-1}-\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}$ can be extended to a compact operator, $\left(\Gamma_{0} \Pi_{2}\left(A^{*}+i\right)^{-1}\right)^{*} B(y) \Gamma_{0} \Pi_{2}\left(A_{0}-i\right)^{-1}$, in $\mathcal{H}$.

Finally we show (A3). Using $F_{j}(j=P, S, S H, R)$ (see the Appendix), we construct $P_{ \pm}$as follows:

\end{array}\right)\right\} T
\end{align*}

where

T=\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}\left(\begin{array}{cc}
L_{0}^{1 / 2} & i I_{3 \times 3} \\
L_{0}^{1 / 2} & -i I_{3 \times 3}
\end{array}\right)
$$

and $P_{-}^{(3)}$ (resp. $P_{+}^{(3)}$ ) and $P_{-}^{(2)}$ (resp. $P_{+}^{(2)}$ ) are negative (resp. positive) spectral projections of

D^{(3)}=\frac{1}{2 i}\left(k \cdot \nabla_{k}+\nabla_{k} \cdot k\right) \quad \text { and } \quad D^{(2)}=\frac{1}{2 i}\left(p \cdot \nabla_{p}+\nabla_{p} \cdot p\right), \quad \text { respectively, }
$$

where $k=\left(p, p_{3}\right) \in \mathbf{R}^{2} \times \mathbf{R}_{+}$.

Using the representation of the generalized eigenfunction of $L_{0}$ and the Mellin transformation we show (A3.1)~(A3.4) (cf. Perry [14] and Kadowaki [6]). The Mellin transformations for $D^{(3)}, D^{(2)}$ are given as

where $u(k) \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3} \backslash\{0\}\right), v(p) \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\mathbf{R}^{2} \backslash\{0\}\right), \omega \in \mathbf{S}_{+}^{2}=\left\{\left(\omega_{1}, \omega_{2}, \omega_{3}\right)=\left(\bar{\omega}, \omega_{3}\right) \in\right.$ $\left.\mathbf{S}^{2}: \omega_{3}>0\right\}$ and $\nu \in \mathbf{S}^{1}$.

Then $M^{(3)}$ (resp. $M^{(2)}$ ) is extended to a unitary operator from $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}_{+}^{3}\right)$ (resp. $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}^{2}\right)$ ) to $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R} \times \mathbf{S}_{+}^{2}\right)\left(\right.$ resp. $\left.L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R} \times \mathbf{S}^{1}\right)\right)$ (cf. [14, Lemma 2]).

Proposition 3.4. $\quad P_{ \pm}$from (3.3) satisfy (A3).
To show Proposition 3.4 we prepare
Lemma 3.5. Let $\psi(\lambda)$ be as in (A3) and $0<\delta<c_{R}$ (for $c_{R}$, see the Appendix). Then for any positive integer $N$ and $t \in \mathbf{R}_{ \pm}$, there exists a positive constant $C_{N, \psi}$ which is independent of $t$ such that

## Application 2 (Schrödinger equation with complex valued potential)

Let $x \in \mathbf{R}^{n}$ and $\mathcal{H}=L^{2}\left(\mathbf{R}^{n}\right)$, where $n \geqq 3$. We assume that $B(x)$ is a measurable function which satisfies

Choosing the positive (resp. negative) spectral projection of $D=1 /(2 i)\left(x \cdot \nabla_{x}+\nabla_{x} \cdot x\right)$ as $P_{+}$(resp. $P_{-}$) of (A3) and using Perry's lemma ([14, Lemma 1]) together with (3.20) we show (A3.1)~(A3.4) in the same way as in the proof in Application 1.

## Application 3 (Acoustic wave equation with dissipative term)

Let $x \in \mathbf{R}^{n}$, where $n \geqq 1$. We consider the following equation:

where $\varphi(r)$ is as in Application 2.
For (3.21) and (3.22) with a formulation similar to that in Application 1 (for the details, see Mochizuki [13]), we can also derive the conclusions in Theorem 1, Corollary 2 and Theorem 3. We omit the details and content ourselves by giving a brief comment on (A1), (A2) and (A3).

Due to [13] the operators associated with (3.21) and (3.22) satisfy (A1) and (A2) in suitable Hilbert spaces, and they generate a contraction semi-group and unitary group, respectively. Moreover $P_{ \pm}$in (A3) are defined as follows.

Let $\mathfrak{F}$ be the Fourier transformation. Let $k \in \mathbf{R}^{n}$ be the dual variable of $x$. Then we write $P_{+}^{(n)}$ (resp. $P_{-}^{(n)}$ ) as the positive (resp. negative) spectral projection of $1 /(2 i)\left(k \cdot \nabla_{k}+\nabla_{k} \cdot k\right)$. We set
