Naza Tanović Miller. It is with great sorrow that we inform our readers of the death on November 15, 2001 of Naza Tanović Miller, wife of Harry I. Miller. Naza was born and raised in Sarajevo. She came to the United States in the early 60s to study mathematics at the Illinois Institute of Technology where she met Harry. They were married in 1965 and moved to Sarajevo in 1969 after Naza got her Ph. D. They worked together to increase the level of mathematical activity in Sarajevo and in 1985 founded an international research journal, Radovi Matematicčki. Everything changed when the war began in May, 1992. After nearly being killed several times, they escaped to the USA, where Harry became the department chair at University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. From there they worked endlessly and tirelessly to bring the war to an end. When it ended in 1998, Naza returned to Sarajevo where she again worked tirelessly to rebuild the university and the city she knew and loved. Her experiences during the war years are chronicled in her book, Testimony of a Bosnian. I highly recommend it. We extend our sympathy to Harry, his daughters and their families.
