

NOTE ON THE HISTORY OF THE MAP-COLORING
PROBLEM.

THE map-coloring problem has recently been recalled to mind by some questions in the *Intermédiaire des Mathématiciens* and a paper by Mr. P. J. Heawood in the *Quarterly Journal of Mathematics*. Judging from the references given in these places, which mention merely Cayley and De Morgan among the earlier writers on the subject, it does not seem to be generally known that Möbius discussed the question, in a slightly different form, in his lectures in 1840. A note by Professor Baltzer, entitled, "Eine Erinnerung an Möbius und seinen Freund Weiske," relates how the problem was propounded to Möbius by his friend, Professor Weiske, the philologist, and is to be found in the *Berichte der Sächsischen Gesellschaft der Wissenschaften zu Leipzig. 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NOTES.

A REGULAR meeting of the AMERICAN MATHEMATICAL SOCIETY was held in New York on Saturday afternoon, March 27, at three o'clock, the Vice-President, Professor R. S. WOODWARD, in the chair. There were seventeen members present. On the recommendation of the Council, the following persons, nominated at the preceding meeting, were elected to membership: Mr. WILLIAM FREELAND, Harvard School, New York, N.
